SUBJECT: Fingerprinting and Photographing of Juveniles		Related Laws: ORS 419A.250, ORS 419C.080

POLICY: Employees must act reasonably and within the limits of their authority as defined by statute and judicial interpretation, insuring that the rights of both the individual and society are protected.

RULE: ORS 419A.250 establishes the state law guidelines on the topic of juvenile fingerprinting and photography, "Authority; segregation of records; access; when records may be kept with those of adults; destruction of records; missing children."

PROCEDURE:

- I. <u>Legal Guidelines</u>
 - A. A juvenile may be photographed or fingerprinted by a law enforcement agency:
 - 1. Pursuant to search warrants.
 - 2. According to laws concerning adults, if the child has been transferred (remanded) to criminal court for prosecution.
 - 3. With consent of both child and parent, after advice that they are not required to give such consent.
 - 4. Upon request or consent of the child's parent alone, if the child is less than 10 years and the original photographs or fingerprints are delivered to the parents.
 - 5. By order of the Juvenile Court.
 - B. When a juvenile is taken into custody under ORS 419C.080, the juvenile shall be photographed and fingerprinted.
 - C. Fingerprint and Photograph files or records of juveniles shall be kept separate from adults.

- D. Fingerprint and photographs files or records of juveniles shall be disclosed only to the following:
 - 1. Public agencies for use in a criminal investigation only when the information is pertinent to a specific investigation.
 - 2. The juvenile department and juvenile court.
 - 3. Caseworkers and counselors responsible for the care of such juvenile.
 - 4. The parties to the proceeding and their counsel.
 - 5. The victim or witness of an act described under ORS 419C.005.
- E. Fingerprint and photograph files and records of a juvenile shall be sent to a central state depository same as adult files and records.
- F. Fingerprint and photograph files and records of a juvenile shall be destroyed when the juvenile court orders expunction of record.
- G. The parent or guardian of a missing juvenile may submit a fingerprint card and photograph to a member of Lane County Sheriff's Office when a missing person report is filed. The fingerprint card may then be submitted to OSP, LEDS, and AFIS.

II. <u>Obtaining Fingerprints and Photographs</u>

- A. Juveniles should be printed at the Main Office in the Central Reception area.
- B. If a juvenile is printed during non-office hours, Police Records staff will be responsible for forwarding the prints to OSB ID Services the following business day.
